From Our Executive Director & Senior Minister



Members of the congregation at UU Wellesley Hills stand for their weekly Black Lives Matter stand out.

A few weeks ago I visited one of the UU Urban Ministry's member congregations where, every Sunday since George Floyd was killed, they hold a quiet streetside Black Lives Matter vigil.

After the service, members pick a sign from the stack they keep, and stand on the sidewalk as cars pass. Every Sunday for 144 Sundays, or thereabouts.

They held the signs through the killing of 10 people in a Black neighborhood in a Buffalo neighborhood, and through the killing of Tyre Nichols.

It's not a flashy event, and it hasn't stemmed the violence against Black people. But in the deepest part of my heart I believe that witnessing matters, and faithful witnessing matters even more. And that when we show up again and again without ceasing, that we create the space for change to move in.

This week at the UU Urban Ministry we shared a report on the history of enslavement at First Church in Roxbury. The report found 58 people of African and Indigenous heritage had been enslaved by the church's white parishioners from 1631 to 1775. Even the first minister was an enslaver. There is an unbroken line from this history to the present day, and how racism shows itself in every single system in Greater Boston.

Witnessing, listening, hearing. These will not, of themselves, make the change that's needed.

But they make way. They make a path.

And may we move our feet onto it, faithful and without ceasing.

Examining our History

Earlier this week, the final report on the <u>Race and Slavery at the First Church in Roxbury</u>, authored by Aabid Allibhai and commissioned by the Roxbury Historical Society and the UU Urban Ministry, was released. For months, Aabid, a graduate student at Harvard, has been writing this look at the history of enslavement as it pertains to our history here in Roxbury. A draft of the report was presented to a group of local historians, educators, and others last month in order to garner feedback that would be used to complete the narrative.

Then on Monday, February 6th, a group of our neighbors and supporters gathered in Putnam Chapel (on the UUUM campus) for a presentation of the final report.

This report tells about the history of slavery in New England during the period of 1631-1775. Plus, the report tells the story of at least fifty-eight human beings —Black and Indigenous men, women, and children—who were enslaved by First Church's white parishioners.



This truer look at our history than those that have been told in the past - is one that deserves light, examination, and deliberation. That is why we were happy to have reporters from The

Boston Globe and The Bay State Banner here to join us. This commitment, to a truer examination of our history, was put in writing by UUUM's board and leadership in 2021's "We Speak Now". Although we have made progress, there is much to do, and this examination of our history will continue. We invite you to join us in this work.






From our friends at the <u>Dillaway-Thomas House</u>
